


#### EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS & **EVENTS**

#### 1000s expected impact

The E.C.O. Center continues to be graciously awarded an annual grant from the International Paper Foundation. This year's funds were used to print and install 10 informational signs about wetland functions, plants, and animals. These signs give anyone who passes through our Wetlands Demonstration Area the opportunity to better understand their significance and roles in ecosystems.
