2976 students

The E.C.O. Center's 2021 school programs consisted of large and small groups from public schools, private schools, homeschool groups, and college classes. With educational content centered on wildlife and natural resources, we created interactive opportunities, both in-person and virtually, for students preschool through college. The E.C.O. Center continues to develop curriculum and content that is relevant to the current ecological trends and topics.







EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS & EVENTS

The E.C.O. Center provided educational opportunities for both children and adults beyond our school programs including youth archery, videos, Little Critters preschool programs, a valentine's craft day, and Christmas with the Critters. A variety of programs and events leads us to reach a diversity of populations.







SPEAKER SERIES



262 students & adults

The E.C.O. Center proudly offers a series of educational presentations by various wildlife and natural resource professionals each year. These programs cover a multitude of topics and are free for the public to attend. This year we hosted 5 events, covering native/invasive species, fisheries, snakes of Georgia, bats, and Georgia amphibians. Presenters were from the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Berry College, and The Amphibian Foundation.





ANIMAL EXHIBITS



34 exhibits & habitats

The E.C.O. Center proudly maintained 34 animal exhibits that showcase some of the native wildlife of Northwest Georgia. Many of these animals were used in hands-on educational programs and were the focus for walk-in visitors. Our exhibits and habitats are meticulously maintained on a daily basis by staff & volunteers.






In addition to regular maintenance, the E.C.O. Center made the following additions and improvements:
